State Department to Investigate Ethiopian Adoptions

Over the past two years Ethiopia has become a mecca for overseas adoptions with nearly one out of five children adopted by Americans. While there is no proof of fraud, the U.S. State Department has begun an investigation of adoptions that took place between 2009 to 2010 and has found inaccurate paperwork and evidence of orphanages using financial incentives to recruit children from Ethiopian families. Ethiopia is not party to The Hague Convention, a treaty to guarantee intercountry adoption is in the child's best interest.

Chinese Adoptee Reunites 50 years After Adoption

Taylor Kidd was adopted by an American family nearly 50 years ago at the age of 10 months. Her recent reunion in Taiwan with her birth family was nearly thwarted by the Taiwanese adoption organization forbidding the family from seeking her in the United States. Her parents could not provide for the already eight children in the home and her birth mother's illness that required hospitalization led to the adoption. At the reunion a birth brother who is an actor said upon meeting her, "She is an exact look-alike of our late father."

Custodial Grandparent Rates Soar to Over 2.5 Million

AARP reports that over 2.5 million grandparents are raising their grandchildren, the highest rate recorded in the past 40 years. Among the reasons are that the non-custodial parents have experienced teen pregnancy, abandonment, drug use, mental health issues, military deployment or incarcerations. The economy has also played a factor. Many are doing kinship care to keep their grandchildren from entering into foster care. The 2008 federal Fostering Connections Act requires states to consider relatives first in making placement decisions when a child is removed from a home due to abuse or neglect.

Teen Birthrates Drop

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, fewer babies were born to teenagers in 2010 than in any year since 1946 when teen pregnancy was first tracked. In 2010, the teen birthrates were 34 births per 1,000 teens which reflects a 44 percent drop from 1991. Minnesota statistics show that teenagers had 22.5 births per 1,000 in 2010.

Left to die as a newborn in an orange grove, Nick Young envisions his upcoming graduation as he collects money in a tip jar at the tropical fruit shop where he now works in Palm Beach. Young will soon graduate from Florida A & M. When a local TV spotlighted his story when he was abandoned, Dorothy Young told her husband at the time, "That's my baby." Dorothy and Carl had recently signed up to be foster parents through the One Church One Child program and took in the six-week-old child and adopted him when he was two.

Missouri Considers Law to Remove Birthfather Consents in Adoptions

Following a six year battle in which a Missouri birthfather regained custody of his child who had been adopted, legislation is being considered that would allow adoptions without birthfather consent. Currently Missouri requires that putative fathers declare their paternity within 15 days of a child's birth, a date that had passed in the earlier case as the father awaited DNA test results.

Arizona Considers Cuts to Foster Care Assistance

State lawmakers in Arizona are considering cutting funding to Child Protective Services that would include foster care assistance by 50 to 60 percent. Feedback from foster parents is that they would no longer be able to provide the basics of clothing and food to children. The state has 11,500 children in foster care, but fewer than 10,000 foster homes.

DNA Cells Shut Down in Children Experiencing Violence

A new Duke University study finds that children who have experienced violence have DNA similar to that found in aging persons. The long-term study of 118 pairs of identical twins found the children who had witnessed or experienced violence have a greater risk of mental and physical disorders as adults. Also found was a greater susceptibility to disease, a factor of biological aging. The Duke study continues with the twins to investigate evidence of health problems such as diabetes or higher blood pressure.

Two Proposed Bills Affect Funding

On April 17, Representative Braley from Iowa introduced the Making Adoption Affordable Act that would increase the federal adoption tax credit to \$13,170 from \$12,650. The proposed bill would make the tax credit permanent and refundable beginning in 2012 tax year. [View Bill \(HR4373\)](#)

The House Ways and Means Committee voted on April 18 to eliminate Social Services Block Grant (SSBG) which funds state child and family services. It was reported in 2009 that 22 states accessed \$45 million in the SSBG fund that assisted in the adoption of children from foster care. The Evan B.
