Couple Adopt from Guatemala after Years Delay

In 2007 Guatemala charges of corruption surfaced surrounding the adoptions to other countries. Rob and Tammy York of Greencastle, Indiana were among 44 couples whose adoptions were put on hold.

On August 22 the Guatemalan government ruled to approve the adoption cases that were already in process before the shutdown. Hoping for no further delays, Rob and Tammy York can now finalize the adoption of daughter Meilani who is now three. Families need proof that they have established a relationship with the child and no fraud has occurred. Tammy York says, "My optimism needed to be guarded because every time that we thought we are going forward, something happens to where it halts us."

Sisters Reunite After Fifty Years

Peggy Crookes was the oldest of eight siblings separated by adoption in the 1960s in Canada. A stint in foster care was followed by adoption of some of the children into various families. Separated from each other, three of the sisters began searches two decades ago, an effort thwarted by Ontario confidentiality laws. The government relented when one of the sisters developed breast cancer, leading to a reunion spanning fifty years of separation that was to include their birth father who died shortly before they could reunite.

New York Adoptees Explore Grey Market Backgrounds

New York lawyer Seymour Fenichel, now deceased, was convicted of more than 100 counts of grey market adoption in the 1980s. Today, children such as Beni Cunningham who Fenichel illegally placed for adoption are having difficulty finding birth families with their information, often invented. Cunningham is using Facebook with a page titled, "Seymour Fenichel Adoptees and First Moms" to connect families. She says, "We are all in this together and our goal is not to give up until everyone is reunited."

Rhode Island Adult Adoptees May Request Copies of Original Birth Certificates

Amendments to state law passed in July 2011 will allow Rhode Island-born adoptees age 25 and older to receive non-certified copies of their original, unaltered birth certificates from the State Office of Vital Records. The State Office maintains sealed files of pre-adoption birth certificates for all children who were born in Rhode Island. Adoptees may request copies of their certificates beginning March 1, 2012. Advocacy Groups Rally Congress to Oppose Plan to "Consolidate" ADHD and Other Disability Programs

Advocacy groups representing concerns of disabled children are opposing the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) plan to combine programs serving populations with a diverse set of diagnoses. Disability programs for those diagnosed with spina bifida, autism, ADHD, spinal cord injuries and muscular dystrophy would be united into one line item in the federal budget. A considerable cut in funding is projected. Groups such as CHADD (Children and Adults with Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorders) believe that the proposal did not include input from those served and lacks analysis of the impact on children and families.

Birthfather Wants Reunion with Steve Jobs

Abdulfattah John Jandali, a Syrian immigrant who now works as a vice-president at a casino in Reno, Nevada has reportedly been trying to reach his birth son, former Apple CEO, Steve Jobs. Jandali told the *New York Post* that he did not know until a few years ago that the son he and his ex-wife had given up for adoption grew up to be one of the founders of Apple Computer. Jandahi told *The Post* he would have kept the baby but his wife's father did not approve of her marriage to a Syrian, so Job's birthmother moved to San Francisco to have the baby alone and give it up for adoption. Janddali said he hoped Jobs would call him someday and would be happy if the two of them got a cup of coffee together once "before it is too late."

Research

Brodzinsky Explores a Child's Understanding of Adoption

Researcher and psychologist David M. Brodzinsky has released his implications for psychological adjustments related to a child's understanding of their adoption. The study provides a child developmental perspective with particular attention to the multidimensional nature of adoption-related loss. Brodzinsky concludes that few understand the depth of loss and how varied it manifests among adopted persons. Guidelines are given for discussing adoption with children including introducing difficult background information, listening to the child's response and considering the child's developmental level and readiness to process information.

Foster Care Numbers Drop

The latest Adoption and Foster Care Analysis and Reporting System (AFCARS) Report for FY 2010 reflects a continuing drop in the number of children in foster care in America.

As of September 30, 2010

- There were 408,425 children in foster care
- The average age of children in foster care was 9.4 years
- Forty eight percent in foster care were in foster family homes, followed by 26 percent in relative family placements
- The largest percentage of children (51 percent) had reunification with parents or primary caregivers as their placement goal
- There were 107,011 children waiting to be adopted
- Of the children in foster care, 41 percent were Caucasian, 29 percent were African American, and 21 percent were Hispanic
- Of the children adopted from foster care that year, 53 percent were adopted by a foster parent and 32 percent were adopted by another relative

Children Fare Better in Families Than Foster Care

Data collected by researchers Christopher Lloyd and Richard Barth was featured in a recent issue of *Children and Youth Service Review*. The study compared developmental outcomes of 353 children, ages 5 1/2, who had entered care as toddlers and later reunified with original family or were adopted. The research showed positive outcomes as compared to the children who remained in foster care that scored the lowest on seven of eight outcomes.

U of M Adoption Competency Certificate Available for Professionals

Starting on October 7, 2011 in the Twin Cities and October 14, 2011 in Duluth, adoption professionals will be able to attain a Permanency and Adoption Competency Certificate through the University of Minnesota. Due to funding from the Minnesota Department of Human Services, the certificate will be available at a considerable savings. Funding will come via Title IV-E for the pilot year. County child welfare participants may pay directly or have their county pay for tuition through a purchase order. Participants may include child welfare workers and mental health clinical professionals.
