Parties Match Children and Families

A new British pilot study reveals that matching between prospective adoptive families and children is more effective than many other recruitment measures. Researchers report that meeting children in a social setting changes the view of many prospective adoptive parents about the type of child they might adopt, including adoption of older teens or children who come from traumatic backgrounds. The researchers stressed that while the events were often organized around children's parties, intensive preparation of the children and adults in attendance ensured success regarding expectations of all participants before and after the event.

Chinese One-Child Policy Reconsidered

Chinese leaders are being urged by a government think tank to allow two children for each family. Proposed is a gradual plan that would implement two children in some provinces immediately and nationally by 2015 with all birth limits dropped by 2020. Aside from gender imbalances, the one-child policy has resulted in large numbers of elderly that must be supported by a shrinking youthful population.

Minnesota Russian Charter School Offers Culture, Language

A four-year effort on the part of Slavic community to address the educational needs of their children has resulted in Nasha Shkola, literally translated as "Our School." Rather than being an immersion school, Nasha Shkola provides Kindergarten through 5th grade students with all classes taught in English and a daily class in Russian. Students participate in extended day programs with hands-on cultural learning. For families with children who have been adopted from Eastern Europe, the school offers opportunities to study the culture and language of the children's country of origin.

Would You Adopt A Teen?

A recent online survey conducted by Harris Interactive on behalf of the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption asked nearly 2,500 individuals if they would adopt a teen from foster care. The results showed that 18 percent would, 58 percent would not, and 24 percent were unsure. The survey further found that deterrents to adopting include age of the prospective parent(s), economic or housing issues, and the presence of other children in the family. The population most amendable to adopting teens are women ages 18 to 34 and unmarried persons.

Even when he met and learned a family was interested in adopting him, he didn't dare to hope. Today he attends technical college and says, "It's nice to know you have someone, a family, to always fall back on when you have troubles."

The 15th Annual Circus of the Heart focused on celebration and recruitment of families for the 355 children who still wait. Aside from games, pony rides, face painting, a teen room, petting zoo, and prizes for families and teens, the event kicked off November as National Adoption Awareness Month. Counties Celebrate National Adoption Day

November 17, designated as National Adoption Day in many Minnesota counties, offers courts opening their doors to finalize adoptions of children from foster care. Since 2000, more than 35,000 children in the United States have had their adoptions finalized on National Adoption Day.

Anoka County had six families finalizing adoptions, including one family adopting a sibling group of six to complete their family of ten (see picture below). An 18-year-old former state ward from Anoka

County was adopted in an adult adoption.

Approximately 100 persons attended the Ramsey County 6th Annual National Adoption Day event with the Honorable Judge Diane Alshouse finalizing adoptions of ten children during the celebration. One family adopted a sibling group of six older youth, ranging in ages from 10 to 17. Two of the teen girls from the sibling group shared their inspiring story of challenge and triumph, crediting the divine intervention of God for finding them a family who would commit to keeping the large sibling group together, to love and parent them in addition to their own three birth children.

Dakota County acknowledged National Adoption Month in conjunction with monthly Adoption Support Groups for parents and children. In addition to adoption staff and adoptive families, county assistance attorneys, and guardians ad litem attended in recognition of new adoptive families.

Somewhere Between, a new documentary by *Whale Rider's* producer Linda Goldstein Knowlton, opens in Minneapolis, November 16 and runs through November 22, at the St. Anthony Main Theater. The film portrays transracial adoption through the actual voices of teen adoptees and is attracting sold out audiences from New York to California. Kenneth Turan of the *Los Angeles Times* describes the teenagers as "poised, articulate, and candid. Their position between cultures--some of them are the only Chinese person in the cities they live in--has made them more than usual very thoughtful and self-aware. Kinship care is steadily increasing in Minnesota, at least 21,000 grandparents are raising their grandchildren--this does not account for the children being raised by other relatives or friends. Often the journey to providing permanency and stability for these children can be complicated.
