In the past Peter Byrne, 66, had regularly knocked on his now-deceased birth mother's door to pick up a colleague who turned out to be his step-sister. He also worked along side his older half brother Stuart at an engineering firm. A former wife and younger half sister had been waitresses together at a local restaurant.

Magazine Explores Adoption Termination

August 2010

In *Brain/Child: The Working Mother Magazine*, Dawn Friedman investigates disruptions of adoption that occur before finalization and dissolutions that occur after finalization. Focusing on international adoption, the article title "Myth of the Forever Family" follows several adoptions to families with children diagnosed with Reactive Attachment Disorder or Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder. Calling adoption termination "the industry's dirty little secret," Friedman suggests having realistic expectations on the part of both parents and placing agencies. She cites experts who recommend not pathologizing children, but rather adjusting expectations and appreciating the child behind behaviors that result from deprived environments.

North Carolina Eases Reunion for Adoptees

August 2010

A new bill will take effect in North Carolina on October 1, 2010 that will lower the age of adoptees from 21 to 18, allowing them to use a Confidential Intermediary Program to locate birth family. The program will also be available to adult biological siblings of adult adoptees, adult biological half siblings of adult adoptees, adult family members of deceased adoptees and adult family members of a deceased biological parent.

Adoption Pioneer Dies

July 2010

Annette Baran, a crusader for full disclosed adoption, died at the age of 83 on July 11, 2010. The clinical social worker and psychotherapist co-wrote *The Adoption Triangle, The Effects of the Sealed Record on Adoptees, Birth Parents, and Adoptive Parents*, a 1978 book that argued that an adoptee's knowledge of birth parents is crucial to healthy identity. Many credit this book with shaping the open adoption movement.

DNA Expert Locates Birth Family

August 2010

Genetics expert Andrew Rowan learned he had been adopted after the death of his adoptive mother in 1993. Rowan set out to find birth family members. Before locating them, he said, "It is quite ironic that I work with DNA on a daily basis. It will be DNA technology, DNA tools that will in the end help me to identify any mother, father, brothers or sisters." Television, rather than DNA, connected Rowan to his relatives following a report that aired on BBC's *Reporting Scotland* program.

Illinois Release First Birth Certificate under New Law

August 2010

On August 9, 2010, Illinois Governor Pat Quinn presented a 73-year-old Illinois adoptee with the first non-certified copy of an original birth certificate made possible under new law that took effect in late May. "When I was born in 1937, adoptees' birth records were never sealed," said Joel Chrastka of Berwyn. "But, by the time I was an adult and had learned about my adoption, my original birth certificate had already been retroactively seal for 100 years."

July 2010

Now that Oprah Winfrey has started her own network, OWN or Oprah Winfrey Network, she plans to partner with New York professional genealogist Pam Slaton in a series based on search and reunion. In 1996, Slaton helped rap artist Darryl McDaniel of DMC fame find his birth mother when he learned at the age of 35 that he was adopted. Childhood Abuse Linked to Adult Heart Disease

August 2010

University of Toronto researchers have discovered a significantly elevated rate of heart disease in adults that experienced childhood physical abuse. Some had 45 percent higher odds of having heart disease when compared to peers that had not experienced abuse after adjusting for the known risk factors for heart disease.

John Frank, Director of Scottish Collaboration for Public Health Research and Policy said, "This finding, if replicated in other studies, suggests that patients known to have experienced child abuse or neglect should have their cardiovascular risk factors managed somewhat more aggressively than other persons, since they are at a greater risk."

Abused Children Benefit from Skills Training

August 2010

Researchers from the University of Colorado School of Medicine in a random trial of 150 foster children have discovered that mentoring along with training in coping skills can help them improve their mental health and their satisfaction with life. Cited as "a promising model," the nine-month program significantly improved outcomes for children who participated in skills groups that met regularly and follow a curriculum that include anger management and building healthy relationships. Each child was also provided a mentor.

CLC Adapts Holistic Approach with Foster Youth

The Children's Law Center (CLC) of Minnesota advocates for foster children through legal representation and systematic reform. To better address the multiple challenges that foster youth face, CLC is adapting a holistic approach that goes far beyond legal representation. While volunteer lawyers assist with such matters as expunging juvenile records, immigration, appellate advocacy, health law, and public benefits, CLC also helps foster children find summer camps, scholarship opportunities, job training, financial management, mentors, tutors, therapists, or appropriate treatment facilities.

Data Lags on Recession's Impact on Families

August 2010

According to the Annie E. Casey Foundation *2010 KIDS COUNT Data Book*, improvements in child well-being ushered in during the 1990s stalled just before the current economic downturn. The number of Minnesota children in poverty has increased as has the number of children in single-parent households. The Casey information was gathered in 2007 and 2008, leading the Foundation's researchers to warn that the full impact of the recession will not be recorded for another year or perhaps longer.
