'Burger King baby' seeks birth mom on Facebook

Facebook postings of adoptees looking for birth parents and vice versa are common enough. Recently, Katheryn Deprill's posting numbered in the tens of thousands of shares, as she pled, "Looking for my birth mother. ... She abandoned me in the Burger King bathroom only hours old, Allentown PA. Please help me find her by sharing my post." At 12, Deprill learned of the abandonment from her adoptive parents who showed her newspaper clippings. So far, no one was responded even though the statute of limitations on child abandonment has expired.

NPR spotlights brain development for orphans

A February 24, 2014 broadcast on National Public Radio reported research findings regarding the impact of being institutionalized on children. EEGs that measured electrical activity in the brains of children who had been raised in institutions discovered disturbingly low levels of brain activity. Even when adopted, institutionalized children, when older were found to have smaller brains and abnormal circuitry in the part of the brain that drives the ability to bond or attach to other humans. Even so, the scientists said that the brain has the ability to rewire and to overcome some of the problems stemming from early neglect.

On March 6, she was surprised on air when 14-year-old Ke'onte surprised her with a hug and his thanks for doing a second filming after he had experienced an adoption disruption. Gloria's second report on Ke'onte, two years after the adoption that "didn't go so well" reached a family, Carol and Scott Cook, who said, "He just spoke to us through the video." Ke'onte, adopted by the Cooks, thanked Campos for her persistence in helping him find a family.

Local bill would allow adult adoptees access to birth records

A bill, HF 2440, has been introduced to the Legislature that would provide Minnesota adopted adults (19 and older) to receive their original birth record. Supported by Minnesota Coalition for Adoption Reform (MCAR) the bill would release birth certificates unless birth parents had signed an Affidavit of Non-Disclosure. Although the Affidavit system has been in effect for many years, only 1,200 adoptees would be prohibited from receiving their birth records, estimated to be around 1% of all adoptees in the state.

Prison baby memoir explores early trauma for adoptee

Local author, adoptee Deborah Jiang Stein, in her book, *Prison Baby*, tells her story of at 12, finding a hidden letter revealing she had been born in prison to an addicted mother. That late discovery set her on a course of self-destruction and exploration of the back story. In a March 10 *StarTribune* article, book reviewer Rosemary Herbert describes the book as captivating and astonishing, saying, "What lifts this trauma-to-redemption tale well above the genre is the author's extraordinary power to harness words to convey what it feels like to be utterly - and ultimately understandably - out of control."

* As of September 1, 2013 there were 889 children under state guardianship with 520 children in immediate need of adoptive families, 333 in pre-adoptive families and 36 in long term foster care by a court order. Our target is ZERO waiting children.
